“DEATH CAR WAS IN POOR SHAPE”

A car which killed a cyclist in South Road, Tottenham, on January 28 was in poor condition, according to a witness at the inquest this week into the death of Antoni Gladysz, a 41-year-old Pole, of Corrigan Ave., Brooklyn.

Mr. P. J. O'Connor, S.M., acting coroner, committed 21-year old William Matthew Honeybone, Cutts Street, North Sunshine, for trial on a charge of manslaughter.

The witness, First Constable Pearce, of the Accident Appreciation squad, said Honeybone had no licence, the handbrake of his car would not work, steering and footbrake were faulty and the vehicle showed signs of poor maintenance, if any.

Mr. O'Connor said Honeybone should have seen the cyclist some distance away.

Young Man to Stand Trial for Road Death

Twenty-one years old William Matthew Honeybone, of 18 Cutts Street, North Sunshine, has been released on bail following a charge of manslaughter against him at Sunshine court on Tuesday.

He will appear at the City Court on Wednesday next. Bail was fixed at £200 with a like surety.

When the charge was laid, Sgt. K. McLeod told Mr. E. B. Walsh, S.M., it was alleged that Honeybone was driving an un-roadworthy vehicle in a dangerous manner, causing the death of a cyclist.

The accident occurred in South Road, Tottenham, near Cash Street, which is only a few yards from the Ashley Street corner at about 7.15 a.m. on Tuesday.

The dead man was Antoni

Gladysz, Corrigan Avenue, Brooklyn.

Mr. Gladysz had been in Australia for some years and had built an attractive home. Arrangements had been completed for the migration of his wife and daughter to Australia and they were due to sail in about two months.
