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# BOY KILLED ON WAY TO SCHOOL

Five-year-old Malcolm John Lock, of 20 Vine St., Braybrook died instantly under the wheels of a semi-trailer as he was crossing Ballarat Rd. on his way to school on Tuesday.

The accident occurred about 60 feet west of Dodd St. about 1.15 p.m. Police have been told the boy started to cross after a woman had pressed the traffic lights button. His mother arrived minutes later.

Senior Constable T. Daly, of Sunshine police, would like to hear from any eye-witnesses.

Action was taken this week.
Action was taken this weeks of Senior Constable Tom Daly, of Sunshine, who investigated the tragedy. After conferences with other officials he succeeded in having the warning time extended from four to seven seconds by an adjustment of the amber lights.

This will give drivers so much more time to stop after pedestrians have pressed the buttons to cross. The increased warning period is expected to operate this week.

DEFATH TRAP

#### DEATH TRAP

This three-lane section of Bal larat Rd. between Ashley and Duke Sts., has been a death-trap for years, with the great est accident record of any simi-lar length of road.

Its poor surface, crush of vehicles and the need for extreme driving vigilance tend to detract motorists from the traffic tract motorists from the traffic signals. Conditions are aggravated by reckless drivers who encroach on the second and third lanes and speed through the Darnley St. blinkers at far above speed limits. Even the school traffic lights are often unheeded by hurrying cars.

The death of a schoolboy as he ran across Ballarat Rd. on his way to the Braybrook State School was recalled at Sunshine Court on Tuesday, when the driver of the semi-trailer which caused his death was charged with failing to observe the traffic signal.
