Young man loses life in holiday tragedy, Graham Elston Doak, Aged 21

Tragedy struck at a well-known Sunshine family over the holidays when Graham Doak, 21 years old son of Mr. and Mrs. O. Doak, of 35 Glengala Road, was accidentally drowned at Wilson's Promontory on 2nd January.

A fine physical specimen, Gra-ham was a powerful swimmer and athlete. Last year he came second in the Victorian weight-lifting championship.

With several other companions, Graham had been hiking at the Promontory and they decided, as it was hot, to swim back to their camp across the bay instead of walking round from Norman Point to Pillar Point at Tidal River.

A heavy surf was running and Graham got into difficulties. Kevin Simmins of Coburg bravely risked his life in a desperate struggle to save Graham.

Local people who knew Graham Doak were greatly shocked at the news of his death for he was a splendid type of young man. With his brother he had run a backyard gymnasum for years and had helped many other young men and boys.

His mother has been very prominent in community service in this district and in her work she has been greatly as sisted by her sons.
